Pastor's Column

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Stone masons restoring an ancient church often reuse the old blocks, turning the weather-worn faces inward and revealing the fresh side to the light. Nothing is hauled away, yet the building emerges looking new. Easter faith works the same way: God does not discard us; He turns the hidden, unspoiled side of our baptism outward and lets the light of Christ polish it.

In these radiant days of Easter, as spring blooms around us, we are reminded of God's promise in Revelation: "Behold, I make all things new" (21:5). This newness doesn't mean throwing away what came before—rather, like those ancient stones turned to show their unblemished faces, God transforms what already exists.

Paul and Barnabas' journey in today's first reading embodies this truth. As they retrace their steps, "strengthening the souls of the disciples," they offer a sobering reminder: "It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God" (Acts 14:21-27). Saint John Chrysostom notes that this realism steadies believers; the apostle "first shows the struggle, then sets before them the prize." Hardship is not a detour; it is God chiseling rough edges so the living stones of His Church fit together.

The vision in Revelation of "a new heaven and a new earth" (21:1) speaks to this divine renovation. Saint Augustine explains that God promises a creation where nothing of the former sorrow even "comes into mind," because divine joy fills every gap the old world left open. Saint John of Damascus adds that the universe will be "changed" the way a garment is refashioned, still itself yet glorified. Easter already plants that future in us; every honest confession, every Mass attended with faith, is a small square of new earth laid down in the soul.

In today's Gospel, Our Lord names the unmistakable badge of discipleship: sacrificial love. "Love one another as I have loved you" (John 13:31-35). Saint Augustine calls this command "the root of all sins when neglected and the loosening of sins when kept." The command is new, explains Origen, because Jesus gives the measure: His own total self-gift. Love, then, is not sentiment; it is a decision to pour out one's life so that another discovers Christ's care.

How might we live this Easter renewal in our daily lives? I offer these simple practices:

- Begin at home. Before arriving for Mass, choose a concrete act of kindness toward each family member. Hidden charity trains the heart better than public gestures.
- Notice who is hurting. A brief conversation with a widow after Mass, a note to someone battling illness—these small bridges keep the community from fragmenting. Paul and Barnabas "re-visited" their converts; we can revisit one another.
- Return to Confession. Let the Lord turn the stone so that the clean face of grace meets the light again.
- Pray Psalm 145 this week. Its refrain—"I will praise your name forever"—loosens the clenched defenses of fear.

The 50 days of Easter are the Church's workshop in hope. The chiseling may feel sharp at times, but the Master Builder has the plan. Each time we choose the difficult love Christ commands, a line of the new Jerusalem's walls rises. Keep at the work; what God began at the font in your baptism, He intends to unveil in glory—and every hardship accepted in faith hastens that unveiling.

May the Risen Lord continue to make all things new in your life and in our parish community.
