

Pastor's Column

Dear Parishioners.

I recently listened to a Podcast from my favorite Jesuit, Fr. Robert McTeigue SJ. The episode's title was, "What's Your Parish Good For?" and aired August 23rd on the Catholic Current if you're interested in listening. The question is important and helpful as we continue to think about the direction we are heading as a Church - universally and locally. Fr. McTeigue recounted the painful but all too familiar stories about children and families who disappear from their regular pews the Sunday following confirmation We see it here at St. Ignatius of Loyola Parish, but I've also seen it in many other places.

I remember the first baptism I did in Brazil as a deacon. There was so much preparation for the celebration afterward, the family came all dressed up, and I prepared a short homily emphasizing the mystery of what all was taking place at baptism: a new birth, the life of God beginning in the soul of this child, illumination, and configuration to the body of Christ. I reminded the parents and godparents of how this is only the beginning of a journey that is lived out every day and rejuvenated every Sunday as they attend Holy Mass. The family lived two houses away from our church, not even oneminute walking distance. I never saw them at church again.

What is a Parish for? Why should people come back every Sunday? What is the true calling of every Christian? Fr. Robert McTeigue offers a compelling and perhaps challenging perspective: our parishes should be preparing us for martyrdom.

Martyrdom may seem extreme or out of place in our modern context, but it's crucial to understand why it is relevant. Martyrdom is the ultimate witness to our faith. It comes in two forms: white martyrdom and red martyrdom. White martyrdom, exemplified by St. John the Apostle, involves living out our faith courageously in the face of opposition, ridicule, or persecution. It's about standing firm in our beliefs even when it costs us socially, professionally, or personally. Red martyrdom, on the other hand, is the ultimate sacrifice of giving one's life for Jesus Christ. While less common today in many parts of the world, it remains a reality for Christians in some regions and serves as the pinnacle of faith witness.

Our parish, then, should not merely be a place of comfort or routine religious observance. It should be a training ground for radical discipleship. This perspective transforms our understanding of parish life. Sunday Mass becomes not just a weekly obligation, but a renewal of our commitment to Christ, strengthening us for the challenges we'll face in the world. Our community life should help us support each other in living counter-cultural lives of faith. Our service initiatives are the practice of self-sacrifice and concrete witness to Christ's love. Our prayer and devotional life cultivate the intimacy with Christ that sustains us through trials and tribulations. We have to move beyond complacency. Living faith is active, courageous, and transformative. It pushes us into a Christian identity beyond sacramental moments no matter what the cost.

As your pastor, I invite each of you to reflect on this calling. How can we, as individuals and as a parish community, better prepare ourselves for the challenges of bearing witness to Christ in our world? How can we support each other in living out our faith more courageously?

Let us pray for the grace to be faithful witnesses, whether through the daily 'white martyrdom' of standing firm in our faith amidst a sometimes hostile world, or in the ultimate 'red martyrdom' of sacrificing all for Christ. May our parish truly be a place that forms us for this high calling, so that each of us can say with St. Paul, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith" (2 Timothy 4:7).


